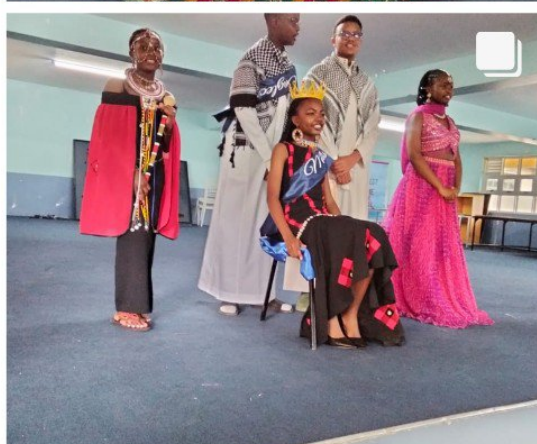

We are thrilled to announce that our school emerged **3rd nationally** at the **97th Kenya Music Festival** held at Kaaga Girls High School, Meru.

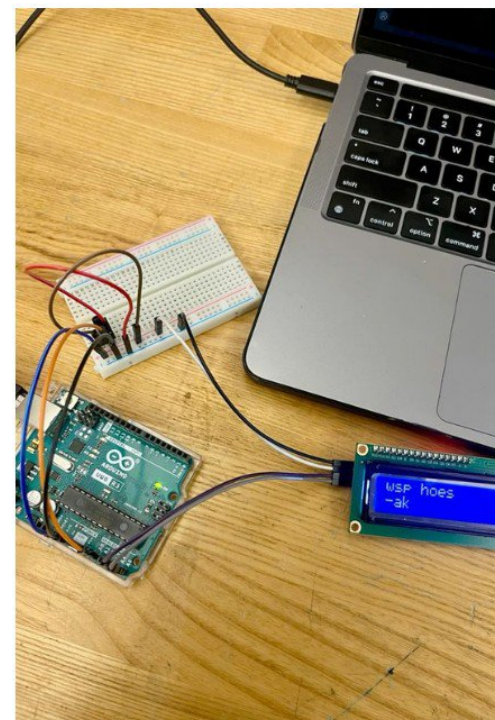
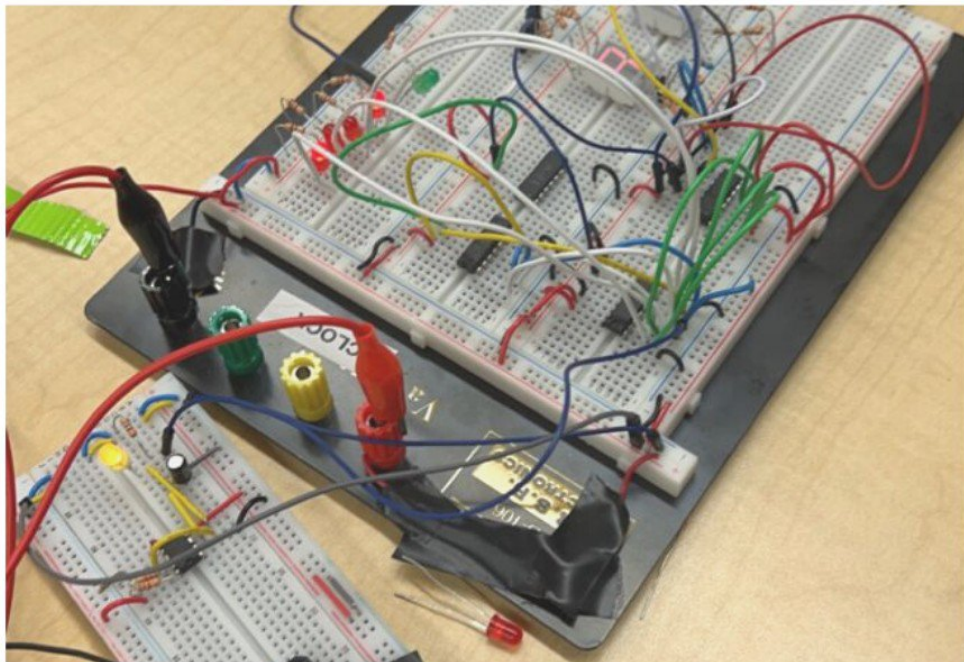

This term, the Cookery Club had a deliciously fun time learning how to prepare a variety of meals. From simple snacks to full dishes, learners explored the joy of cooking through hands-on experience. In this edition, they'll be sharing a step-by-step guide on how to make soft, tasty pancakes. Get your apron ready, it's time to cook!

T H E P A N C A K E S

Ingredients:

- 1 cup all-purpose flour
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup milk
- 1 egg
- 2 tablespoons butter, melted
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract



Instructions:

1. In a large bowl, whisk together the flour, sugar, baking powder, and salt.
2. In a separate bowl, whisk together the milk, egg, melted butter, and vanilla extract (if using).
3. Pour the wet ingredients into the dry ingredients and stir until just combined. Do not overmix the batter.
4. Heat a non-stick pan or griddle over medium heat. Scoop 1/4 cup of batter onto the pan for each pancake.
5. Cook until bubbles form on the surface of the pancake and the edges start to dry out, then flip and cook for another 1-2 minutes until golden brown on both sides.
6. Repeat with the remaining batter.

Serve the pancakes warm with your favorite toppings, such as maple syrup, butter, fresh fruit, or whipped cream. Enjoy!

4K CLUB

THINGS WE DO IN 4K CLUB

In the 4K Club, we learn about agricultural practices such as growing vegetable crops in the school farm. We also take care of chickens and rabbits reared at school.

As club members, we plough the farm to grow vegetables using hoes and fork hoes. After ploughing, we sow seedlings of kale, spinach, and onions.

As the crops grow, we manage them by watering, weeding, adding manure, gapping and controlling pests and diseases. We weed the crops using slashing and uprooting methods. Pests and diseases are managed by applying wood ash.

To fertilize the soil, we use compost manure.

Once the vegetable crops mature, they are harvested and used in the school kitchen to feed the learners.

Kenya was the first country in Africa to embrace the scouting movement. This movement started in 1910 with its first troop established at St. John's Church in Pumwani on 24th November. Initially these early troops were primarily composed of Europeans and Asians. Scouting in Kenya started shortly after its inception in the United Kingdom. The first African troop was formed at Alliance Boys High School in 1927. Sir Robert Baden Powell, the founder of the scouts Movement had a strong connection to Kenya and spent his final years in the country, eventually being buried in Nyeri when he died in 1941.

The second troop was formed in Eldoret in 1925 and Kijabe (Kenton College) in 1926. Scouting in Kenya has since grown into a dynamic youth movement impacting the lives of young people and society as a whole. The Kenya Scouts Association is a member of the world organization of the scout movement. Today, the Kenya Scout Association continues to promote values of service, citizenship, patriotism and personal development among young people.

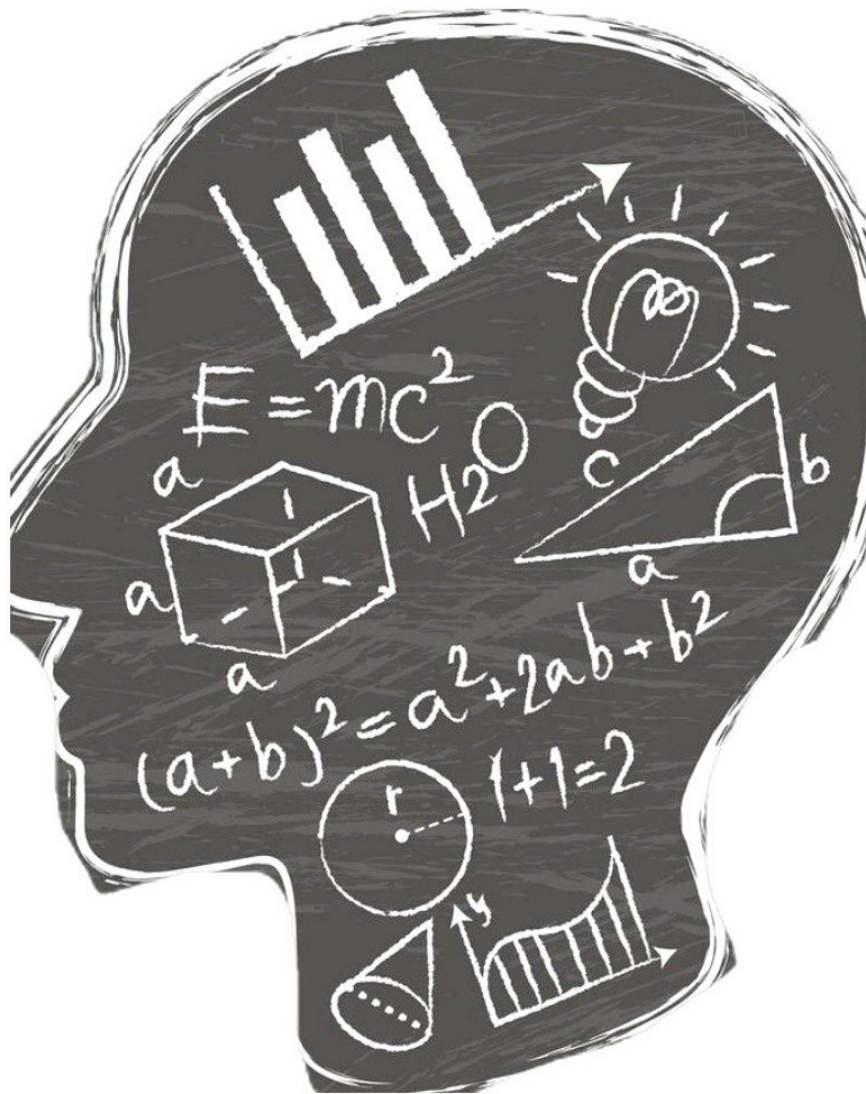
2. WHAT WE'VE BEEN UP TO

KITABU NILICHOKIPENDA MUHULA HUU

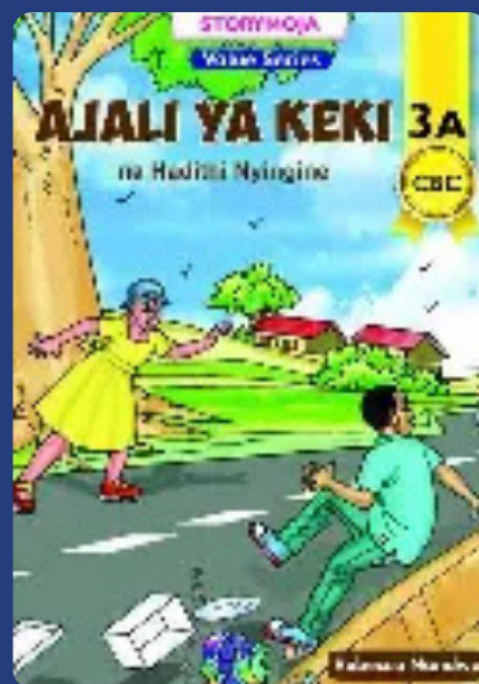

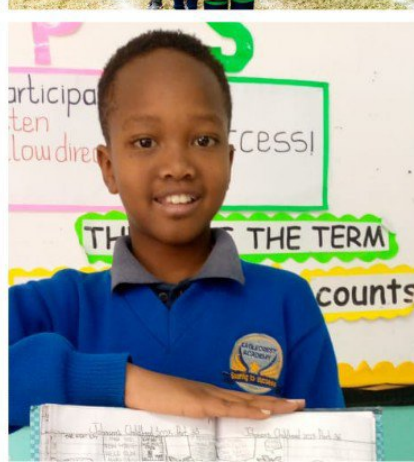

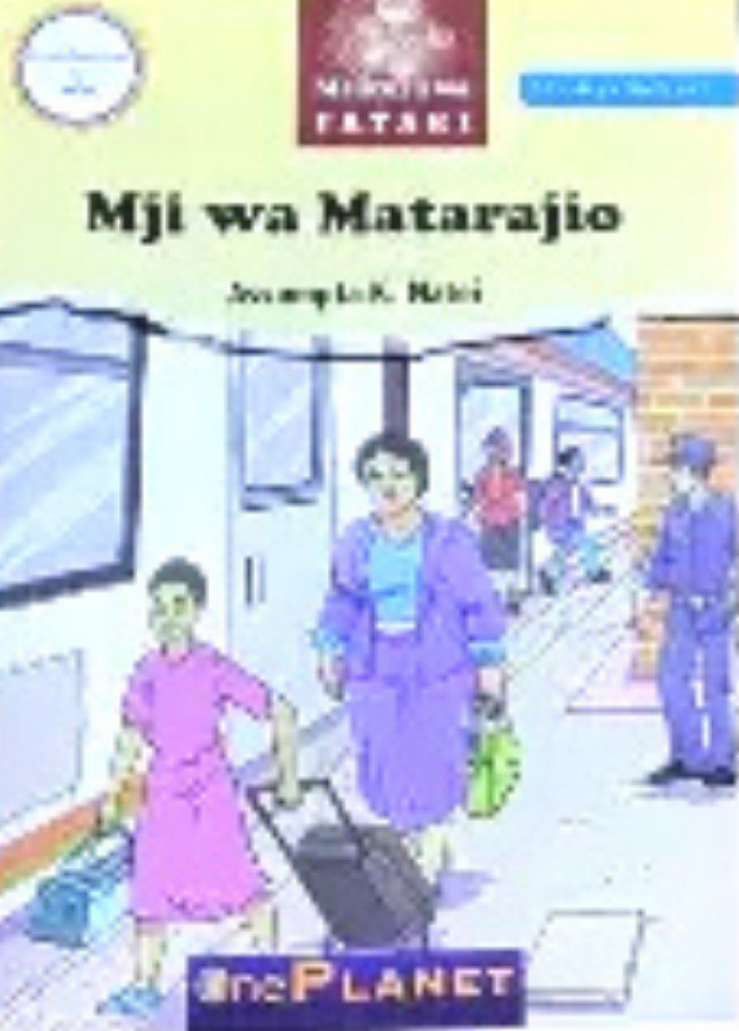
